### Background

**Information:** Currently, art courses in the AASD at the high school level only go through a level two (junior year).

Seniors interested in continuing art are to do so through an independent study. However, this option does not count as one of the five required courses needed to be a fulltime student. This is a deterrent for most students and limits student's access to learning at a high level in art. Having a level three course for each of these classes will support the needs of students who want to further pursue their skills in art and have an aptitude for art. Offering a third level of art for seniors would support students who have a high interest

and aptitude for the visual arts.

**Fiscal Note:** Students will enroll in these courses in the spring for the next school year (instead of when the school year

starts). There may be a slight FTE increase in art at each high school because of this.

#### Instructional

**Impact:** Instructional needs of students with higher level of art skills will be supported with the appropriate content

teacher. Students will have more access to courses that fulfill their full time course load. Also, high school art enrollment will be more accurate in the spring so resources can be allocated to meet the needs of all

students.

#### ITEM FOR CONSIDERATION

Topic: Budget Adoption for the 2021-2022 Fiscal Year

#### **Background Information:**

On October 25, 2021 a public budget hearing was held. At the public hearing Greg Hartjes, Chief Financial officer for the Appleton Area School District, and Holly Burr, Director of Business Services for the District, presented the 2021-2022 budget. The presentation included projections of revenues, expenditures, and tax levy information for the 2021-2022 fiscal year, which began on July 1, 2021.

Administration is requesting approval of the 2021-2022 budget. This budget is based on current revenue and tax levy data from the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction, and falls within the state mandated revenue control limits. Budget statistics include the following:

- a. The final budget of \$231,776,669 represents an increase of \$9,658,508 (4.35%) from 2020-2021.
- b. An overall increase in revenue can be attributed to funding from the Federal government through the Elementary and Secondary School Relief (ESSER) fund of the CRRSA Act, as well as the ESSER fund of the ARP Act.
- c. Three areas with large increases in expenditures are private school vouchers, an increase in overall staffing funded by ESSER II and ESSER III, and employee compensation and benefits.
- d. Tax levies: This information is based on final revenue control and equalization aid information.

#### **Fiscal Note:**

The proposed tax levy of \$72,683,034 represents an increase of 1.31% from last year. The levy rate (mill rate) is estimated to decrease from \$7.96 to \$7.66 per \$1,000 of equalized property value; a decrease of 3.78%. In addition, the tax levy includes a defeasance of \$5,500,000 to prepay long-term debt.

#### **Instructional Impact:**

Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse Grant—The Department of Public Instruction has awarded the Appleton Area School District a grant in the amount of \$25,000 for the AODA Program. The discretionary grant program supports the development and expansion of the district-wide comprehensive, kindergarten through grade 12, alcohol and other drug abuse prevention and early intervention programming as part of a coordinated school health program.

<u>Title I-A Grant</u>—The Department of Public Instruction as awarded the Appleton Area School District a grant in the amount of \$2,158,090.00. This grant is designed to close achievement gaps and ensure that all children have a fair, equal, and significant opportunity to obtain a high-quality education.

Title II-A Grant (Teacher and Principal Training and Recruiting)The Department of Public Instruction has awarded the Appleton
Area School District a grant in the amount of \$403,882. This
funding is used to recruit, train and prepare candidates to
become effective teachers in core academic areas.

Title III-A Grant (English Language Proficiency)-The Department of Public Instruction has awarded the Appleton Area School District a grant in the amount of \$186,591. This grant is designed to improve the education of English learners. These funds may be used to provide supplemental services that improve the English language proficiency and academic achievements of English learners.

<u>Title IV-A Grant</u>—The Department of Public Instruction has awarded the Appleton Area School District with a continuing Title IV-A grant for the 2021-22 fiscal year in the amount of \$139,853. The Title IV-A grant is also known as the Student Support and Academic Enrichment (SSAE) grant and provides the District with capacity buildings, funds to ensure that all students have access to a high quality educational experience.

#### **Education for Homeless Children and Youth Compliance Grant-**

The intent of this grant is to ensure that all children and youth who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence receive access to the same free, appropriate public education, including a preschool education, as provided to other children and youth.

Assessing Educational Impact in Speech and Language Evaluations Grant—The Appleton Education Foundation has awarded the Appleton Area School District a grant in the amount of \$2,000. The purpose of this grant is for Speech-Language pathologists to complete training and coaching on Language Sample Analysis, an evidence-based method of documenting the educational impact of a communication disorder. Using the "Train the Trainer" model will support AASD SLPs for years to come.

The Arts Go to War Historical Model Building Project Grant—The Appleton Education Foundation has awarded the Appleton Area School District-Renaissance School a grant in the amount of \$1,000 from the *Vira and Alan Stoner Education Fund*. The purpose of this grant is on art created as a response to war.

<u>Ukulele in the Middle School Exploratory/Creative Music Class</u>
<u>Grant</u>-The Appleton Education Foundation has awarded the Appleton Area School District-Madison Middle School a grant in the amount of \$3,000 from the *Mile of Music Fund and the AEF Fund*. The purpose of this grant is to purchase ukuleles so each middle school can have 1 instrument shared by 2 students during Exploratory-Creative Music Class.

<u>Sensory Room Grant</u>—The Appleton Education Foundation has awarded the Appleton Area School District-Ferber Elementary School a grant in the amount of \$3,000 from the *Gruner Family Community Mental Wellness Fund and the Betsy Melzer Fund*. 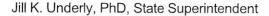
