Here we go. Thank you, Chair. I I'm sure you've heard this from Director Gazza, the golf course continues the trend in amazing records every month. We're setting rounds in excess of 8000 back to back months of June and July, which we've never done in the history. We continue to break gross revenue records. Again, June and July. We don't know when it's going to stop. I guess it won't until we run out of tee times. But until that happens, we're remaining extremely profitable.

Deputy Director Tom Flick (Parks and Rec) 02:49

Of course, our expenses are up with the amount of play. But just a rough number, you know, we're probably \$100,000 ahead of where we were year to date from last year for gross revenue when you take out the expenses. So just again, just knocking it out of the park. They're doing an amazing job, especially with the lack of

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rainfall that we've had this summer and keeping the, you know, the important tees and greens and fairways looking stellar, which they do. So kudos to everybody running it out there. I bet you they're going to be thankful when the temperatures get a little cool—

Thank you, Chair. So I was wondering our year to date from about, say four years ago. I'm guessing you wouldn't know that off the top of your head.

Deputy Director Tom Flick (Parks and Rec) 03:42

So I can—off top my head, I can speak to numbers of what we were, like pre COVID. So we'll go back to '19. On the annual year, we would have probably netted \$60 to \$70,000. That's a really good year for Reid at that time. Then COVID came, and for the first time we netted \$100,000. And in '21, I think we're in like the 150 range. And last year we were in like the 170, upper 70s, close to 180. And right now we're projecting well over 250.

So we'll see how the year ends. I mean, the weather can change. That's with a perfect fall that we're seeing that ladder of increase, but even if we have a cold wet fall, we're still going to most likely exceed 22.
